## Apple Unveils iBook Consumer Portable with Wireless Internet Access at Macworld Expo

### QuickTime TV Debuts with One-Click Access to Highest-Quality Content on Internet

MACWORLD EXPO, NEW YORK—July 21, 1999  
During the kick-off keynote today, Apple introduced iBook, the first consumer portable to provide untethered Internet access for home and schools via AirPort, Apple's revolutionary new wireless local area network (LAN) solution. The Company also unveiled QuickTime TV

(QTV), the Internet's highest-quality network for web-based video and audio, seamlessly integrating four key elements:

Apple's award-winning QuickTime 4 Player software; Apple's open-source QuickTime Streaming Server software; the Apple/Akamai Technologies streamed content delivery service; and compelling content from leading providers.

Building upon its success in the consumer and education mar-

kets with the popular iMac, Apple's iBook, the "iMac to Go" features "all day" battery life of up to 6 hours, a PowerPC G3 processor that outperforms the fastest Intel processor found in any notebook PC\*, and Apple's revolutionary AirPort wireless networking for cable-free Internet access (optional), all in a stunning notebook design available in two eye-catching colors—Blueberry and Tangerine. Additional iBook features include a 12.1" TFT display for super crisp images and video, built-in 56K modem and 10/100BASE-T Ethernet networking, built-in CD-ROM drive, and two built-in antennas and an internal slot to accept Apple's new Airport wireless networking card. iBook's design innovations include a rubber-coated translucent enclosure for durability, a pullout handle for safe carrying, and a unique closing mechanism without latches for faster and easier access.

Demonstrating continued enthusiasm for the Macintosh platform, Apple today also announced that third-party developers have introduced nearly 5,000 new Macintosh software and hardware products in the past 12 months. In one year, third-party software developers have announced 3,935 new software titles for the Macintosh platform. Hardware manufacturers—fueled in part by iMac's support for the Universal Serial Bus (USB) and the Power Macintosh G3 computer's support for USB and Firewire—have developed more than 1,053 new products, ranging from storage devices, printers, scanners and cameras to game controllers. Forty new FireWire devices and 37 Universal Serial Bus (USB) peripherals will make their debut this week at Macworld. The new hardware and software products announced today bring the total number of products shipping on the Mac platform to 13,100. # AppleWorks Tips

## Tip #1: AppleWorks Button Bars

Tip: You can move the button bar by dragging its "grab bar," the two lines that appear at the left or top edge, depending on the button bar's current position.

Tip: While the button bar is positioned at the top or bottom of the screen, you can change only its height, not its width. When the button bar is at the left or right edge of the screen, you can change its width but not its height.

Hiding and showing the button bar: The process for removing the button bar depends on whether it is displayed on the screen or in a floating palette.

🍏 If the button bar is at the top of the screen: for Macintosh, choose window, hide button bar or press SHIFT - COMMAND - X for Windows, choose window - hide button bar, press SHIFT - CTRL - X, or press ALT - W, B.

🍏 If the button bar is a floating palette: click the palette window's close box.

🍏 To show the button bar after it has been hidden: for Macintosh choose window - show button bar or press SHIFT - COMMAND - X for Windows choose window - show button bar, or press SHIFT - CTRL - X, or press ALT - W, B.

## Tip #2

If your graphic comes in with a line on the right side instead of having handles (black boxes) around it, you forgot to click the arrow tool. You are in the text mode, so the graphic is like a word. Click on the

graphic. A box will appear in the lower right corner. This means it is selected, Press the delete key. Click in the arrow tool and drag the graphic over to the file again. This time it will have handles and you can move it anywhere.

## Tip #3

Setting up a document. Before you start typing you need to decide:

- 🍏 Size of paper on which your document is to be printed
- 🍏 Margins you need for the document
- 🍏 A typeface for the document
- 🍏 Whether you want to have page numbers or not.

If you change the appearance of a page number on one page, the appearance changes on all pages of the document.

Use the size pop-up menu on the ruler bar. This pop up menu gives you faster access to font, style, size, and color choices.

When auto-hyphenation is turned on, it is turned on for the entire document. It is not possible to auto-hyphenate just a portion of the text.

Facing pages, side-by-side is best if you are creating a book.

The average size type for reading is 11 point. Here are three examples of common main text type sizes:

10 Point, 11 Point, 12 Point
