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## FreeHand 9

*"Now this is more like it!"*

Boy, I've been using Freehand for what, 4, 5... 6 years now, and somehow they just keep making it better.

What is Freehand? Well it's a drawing program. Not just for drawing - it is also great for web site work, Flash elements (I'll get into this later) and more.

This is one of three or so programs on the market right now, that do similar things, but differently. You might be asking yourself, "then why use this one?" and that would be a fair question to ask. And here's my answer

"It slices, It dices, It makes great Julienne fries." "You can even use it to cut onions without shedding a tear!" Yes folks the amazing Freehand can do it all. Ok, ok - yes I like this program. Now that's not to say the other programs don't do some great things. Remember, it is the program you start using - that you'll most likely end up liking the most.

What I like about FreeHand:

- 🍏 Ease of use
- 🍏 Useful Features
- 🍏 Custom keyboard short cuts, and toolbar customizing
- 🍏 Overall look and feel of the program and it's layout, I must admit, Adobe Illustrator files look much better, MUCH better at viewing on screen. Something I'd like to see Macromedia do with FreeHand.

- 🍏 Great, Cool tools:
  - Lens effect - Great for transparent effect
  - Shadow effect
  - Tracing tool
  - Punch, Union, Cut, Paste into, Custom page sizes with a click, Inset, Transform Color pallet, Freeform tool,

And my favorite - FIND & REPLACE! This outstanding feature allows you to have a color graphic open and change all of the colors with great ease, and this same feature is available for - Fonts, Stroke and more. It's also great for finding and replacing words, symbols and more. So let's say I wrote this whole article and spelled a word wrong (and used it 20 times) once it came to my attention, I could open the "Find and Replace" feature, type in the misspelled word, ask it to find it throughout the document, then type in the correct word and tell it to replace all of the wrong ones with the right one, and they ALL get corrected.

Now it's not to say FreeHand couldn't use a few new features, and here's what I'd like to see with the next version of FreeHand:

- 🍏 Pre-made Custom fills (like Canvas). Great for applying a metal, chrome, pattern look to fonts and more.
- 🍏 Pre-made Paint brushes (like Illustrator). Just more options for paint brushes.
- 🍏 Give me a minute, I'll think of more.

Now I know users of Illustrator who can't stand FreeHand, and vice versa, and that's to be expected. It is like that with almost all programs, drawing, word, internet and so on. But in my humble opinion FreeHand rules!

Oh yes - I highly recommend this program.

Not having the time needed to learn an animation program, but REALLY wanting to add these cool effects to web sites, I decided to give Adobe LiveMotion a try. "Wow" it was real easy and straight forward - just what I was looking for.

Now don't get me wrong MacroMedia Flash is an outstanding program - 2, 3, 4, 20 million whatever it is, users can't be wrong. And it may be easier to use than I think, but I wasn't able to just jump right in and make an animation like I was able to do with LiveMotion.

Now I have got a few of these up so far, and yes they're pretty basic, but it was easy, and that's the key.

Again both are pretty basic, but they took only 20 minutes or so to make.

The features are numerous and I'm sure with time they will increase, as will my ability to find and use these features. LiveMotion is a new program (while the leader has been around for a few years now) with a great future. It works well with all of the other Adobe products, which is growing to be a great selection.

The interface is simple, yet offers many of the same features as programs costing much more, as well as being a lot easier to learn than those programs.

Now a pro and or someone who is used to Flash is not likely to switch over, in my opinion, but the newbie will like LiveMotion and will likely stay with it for a long time.

Priced very reasonable, and easy to use, I see a bright future for Adobe LiveMotion and recommend it to anyone looking to add animation to web sites.

If I can do it - so can you.
